Its key objective is the provision of a high quality daily training environment to assist WA athletes to achieve selection in national teams and to enable their base preparation for international competition to be carried out within the local environment.

The Western Australian Institute of Sport Junior Development Coach will manage the daily training environment for identified WAIS athletes, enhance the relationship with RWA clubs and feeder schools to ensure quality athletes are delivered to the WAIS program and assist in the implementation of WAIS talent identification and development strategies.

The successful applicant will possess the following attributes:

- Sound management, communication and coaching skills;
- Demonstrated ability to work with junior athletes;
- Coaching and/or rowing experience at elite level is also desirable.

Applicants should state their coaching qualifications, experience and personal details. NCAS Level II accreditation is a minimum requirement for Australian applicants.
